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Course overview

Course description

The more carefully a project is researched, planned, and designed, the more likely it is to reach its objectives and produce positive outcomes for cancer patients. Learning about the essential phases of project research, design, management, and evaluation will enable course participants to draft and implement strong breast cancer projects.

In this Master ourse, participants will learn how to find recommendations for breast cancer interventions that are relevant to the resources available to them, conduct preliminary research, plan projects and monitor their outcomes.

This course was developed by UICC as part of its Breast Cancer Programme, in partnership with the US National Cancer Institute Center for Global Health and the Breast Health Global Initiative. It includes material from various Project ECHO® groups working on cancer, including the Project ECHO on breast cancer control, the ICCP Project ECHO and the Cancer in Africa Project ECHO.

This course is accredited by the Accreditation Council of Oncology in Europe (ACOE). On completion of the course participants will be awarded a certificate worth 4 CME credits.

Learning outcomes

By following this course, participants will be able to:

- Find recommendations on evidence-based and resource appropriate interventions
- Understand the steps to assess the context of a project or programme (learn to investigate and assess the needs in your country, the barriers that patients face in accessing cancer services, and assess the health system capacity)
- Determine the feasibility of a project, its cost-effectiveness, and the relevance of an intervention
- Draft a project including the definition of a target population, relevant partnerships and achievable objectives
- Gain knowledge on how to evaluate and communicate about a project

Course delivery

This course will be delivered over 4 modules with approximately 1 hour of content per module as well as additional discussion forum activities and live sessions. The course will be launched on 03 November 2022 and will run live until 19 December 2022.

Target audience

The course will be particularly valuable for individuals working in the following roles:

- Programme leads, coordinators and team members working on breast cancer programmes.
- Ministries of Health involved in the implementation of breast cancer programmes.

This course will be delivered exclusively in English.
