### Overview

UICC is launching a new fellowship offer tailored to sharing advances in health services across Africa:

**Fellowships:**

20 awards of approximately US \$3,000 for a one-month visit to an organisation in another country to learn skills to be shared with the fellow's home network

**World Cancer Congress workshop:**

Opportunity for at least 10 awardees to participate in a knowledge sharing workshop at the World Cancer Congress in Kuala Lumpur in October 2018

**Common Interest Network:**

Fellows will exchange their learning with each other in a best practice network

**Call for applications:**

Opens 22 September 2017  
Closes 30 November 2017

### Awardee deliverables

We expect awardees to deliver the following:

- Submission of an abstract of their project to the 2018 World Cancer Congress
- A report of the fellowship visit including refined plan for knowledge sharing
- Active engagement in UICC's Common Interest Network
- A final report 6 months post-visit outlining initial knowledge sharing results and future plans.

### Candidates and projects

Individuals working in any area across the cancer continuum

This opportunity is for you if you are looking to:

- Improve current services
- Scale up access to services locally, nationally or regionally
- Test implementation of new services or solutions

Examples of projects:

- Community health awareness interventions
- Skills training for community health workers or cancer society volunteers
- Introducing cancer content into general nursing curricula
- Improving pharmaceutical supply chains
- Enabling nurses to lead cervical cancer screening programmes
- Implementing palliative care services or social support
- Enhancing national cancer registry services
- Developing cancer information services

Qualifications required:

Medical professionals must hold relevant qualification e.g. MD, MBBS, Registered Nurse, Diploma of midwifery.

Non-medical applicants, such as those working in cancer societies or NGOs, should hold a Bachelor's degree
